45 New Children Added to Ishe Anesu Project.

- Due to increasing number of children graduating from high school, thus leaving space for new ones to come, we have recruited 45 new students to replace them. Besides those who graduated from high schools, some students simply decided to leave the program to look for jobs to help their families. This group comprises the students who, after completing high school, went on to do vocational training in skilled jobs. Yet another group decided to leave because they felt they were too old to be with much younger children, and among these, three are single parents. The current number of students is now 76. All new students are attending primary schools.
- Ishe Anesu Project together with its Committee members, worked very hard to select the most deserving children. his was the most difficult decision to make as we had to identify the poorest among the very poor children. More than three hundred children had applied for admission to the project but only 45 places were available. The first task we had to do was to provide treatment to most of the children who visibly were in poor health. The children received some over-the-counter medication for wounds, coughing, headaches, etc. By giving them vitamins, we noticed that most of them started to look much healthier than the time they joined Ishe Anesu. Understandably, among the group, 5 children are affected with HIV pandemic. Even so, these 5 are showing signs of better health.

Ishe Anesu History overview:

Ishe Anesu Project is a Charity Organization that started in 1998 with a view to providing education to underprivileged children of Sakubva. In addition to providing education, the project buys school uniforms, provides stationery, conducts Christian education classes, and provides two meals a day for the children. The children enjoy recreation and physical education as well. Ishe Anesu is an after-school project. After their lessons in different schools, the children come to the project to do their homework and to continue to study with the assistance of 2 tutors. In Matthew 25: 30-40 we read, "When I was hungry you gave me something to eat, when I was thirsty you gave me something to drink, I was stranger you invited me inn. I needed clothes and you clothed me. I was in prison you visited me. I was sick you looked after me. Whatever you did for the least of these little children, you did for me."

We, therefore, would like to say that through your prayers and your moral and financial support to Ishe anesu, so many lives are saved; so many children are able to go to school. So many children are healthier. In short, you are making a difference to the lives of the children of Sakubva community. Many have come to accept Christ as their personal Savior. One day a parent came to see us at the project. After expressing her appreciation to us for providing education to her child, she commented, "I had never attended a church service before, but from now on, you will see a lot of me coming to church." This was one of the most encouraging words we have heard from parents and guardians of these children.

The new students are aged between 6 and 10, and they are placed in First and Third grades, respectively. The reason for selecting this age group is that we can easily "mould" them in Christian principles and good behavior. (Proverbs 22:6) "Train a child in the way he/she should go and when he/she is old he/she will not turn from it." In this group we have included 5 children who are HIV/AIDS positive which they acquired from breast feeding. Upon their arrival their state of health was visibly showing their ill health.

New Development at Ishe Anesu:

The Holston Conference of Tennessee, USA, has, for the past 8 years, been sending an ocean freight container with food buckets, school supplies, clothing, health kits, children's blankets and more. One volunteer lady donated her funds to start building a complex comprising 6 to 8 unit homes, a conference room and a playground for the orphans. The orphans are yet to be recruited as we finish constructing a home, each at a time. The orphans will join the current Ishe Anesu children in all the project's activities, except that at the end of the day, the orphans will retreat to the orphanage to spend the night there. Each home will be allocated a matron or a couple who will live with the children, thus providing a real home life environment for the orphans. A photo is attached to this newsletter for your appreciation. Needless to say, we need funds to

complete the construction of the first home and to start the second one. Our humble and deep gratitude to the Holston Conference for their very generous support.

Caroline Muzariwetu (girl) 8 years old in 1st grade. D.O.B. January 17th 2002. Lives with a single mother who is in failing health with HIV/AIDS pandemic. Mother is a vender. They are members of Roman Catholic church.

Tambudzai Chitare (girl) 10 years old in 1st grade. D.O.B. May 13 2000. Father passed away and living with an auntie. No relative willing to send Tambudzai t school. Tambudzai is only used as an instrument labor at home. Now in 1st grade. Members of Roman Catholic church.

Trish Rakabopa (girl) in 7 years old in 2nd grade. D.O.B. Novembe 6th 2003. The father passed away and the mother is a vendor. They are members of AFM.
